# Office of the City Manager:

Citizens, Business Owners & Other Interested Parties:

Since I have been communicating over the last couple of years regular updates on the status of several major public projects planned for Clewiston, I would not be surprised if people were wondering when all the talk was going to produce results. Not surprisingly, given the process required to obtain necessary approvals, funding, design, permits and meet public contracting requirements, significantly impactful projects often take years to advance from ideas to reality. Thanks to perseverance on the part of city officials, the wait and effort has paid off as the City of Clewiston has a number of long-planned and highly anticipated major capital infrastructure projects that are either recently begun or will be underway in the weeks and months ahead. The timing of all these projects was not planned nor necessarily expected to begin simultaneously in 2022, but that is the way it is working out. The following update is one I have been eagerly anticipating providing for some time:

a) Beginning many years ago, the City identified the need and explored options for improved public access to the Herbert Hoover Dike (HHD) and Lake Okeechobee water access and recreation area. Deteriorating conditions at the current canal crossing and the desire to upgrade overall access and address deficiencies while expanding opportunities for enhancement of the entire lakefront area prompted alternative considerations which eventually led to the design of an elevated C-21 bridge span project. The project was subsequently approved, permitted and recently fully funded with state grant dollars thanks to the efforts of Clewiston's current legislative delegation. The \$5.6 million project is now a reality as the City Commission awarded contracts in March and construction is set to begin in the next couple of months with completion expected in 2023. The City continues to consider options for additional enhancements to compliment the bridge project and the lakefront area and would like your input into the planning process. To this end, a public survey has been developed with the assistance of the

- Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council on behalf of the City and can be completed by using the following link to provide feedback <a href="https://surveyhero.com/c/pfexi3hh">https://surveyhero.com/c/pfexi3hh</a>.
- b) One of the City's highest priority transportation improvement projects has for some time been drainage improvements and resurfacing of East Ventura Avenue. After several years of pursuing planning and funding efforts, **this project has finally begun this month**. Utilizing a combination of state grant and City funding sources, the \$1.3 million project is scheduled to be completed later this year to address the consensus worst overall existing street conditions in the community on the section from South Francisco Street to Deane Duff Avenue also with among the highest priority drainage improvement needs in the community that is impactful for immediately adjacent areas particularly to the south of the street section. The City is already focused on utilizing recently approved additional federal and state grant funding in the amount of \$1.8 million to design and then similarly award contracts to complete major improvements to this priority street section including a redesign effort and resurfacing of West Ventura Avenue from Deane Duff Avenue to W.C. Owen Avenue.
- c) Simultaneous to the East Ventura Avenue improvement project currently underway and prior to commencement of the West Ventura street improvement project phasing, the City has also recently awarded contracts to complete the major upgrading of the water lines in the vicinity which serve businesses, residents and publicly-owned properties on sections of Alverdez Avenue, Commercio Street and West Ventura Avenue. This longstanding priority utility project need, which **is under contract and scheduled to begin next week,** will significantly improve water service and fire protection capabilities in much of the downtown area and is entirely funded with **\$0.8 million** in the form of a federal grant allocated to Clewiston as part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) approved by Congress in 2021.
- d) The City is under contract and has for several months been actively engaged with the contractor to complete the Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) utility project. Upon completion in the next year, the project will fully automate the City's utility meter reading and integrated billing process while replacing all electric and water customer meters located throughout the service area both within and outside the city limits. This \$2.4 million project is funded by City electric fund revenues for the electric meter portion and the aforementioned federal ARPA grant funding for the water meter elements.
- e) In a partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to complete a comprehensive conversion from individual septic tanks to the City's public wastewater system of all USACE owned properties located in Clewiston in close proximity to Lake

Okeechobee's HHD area east of and adjacent to the city limits, the Commission has awarded contracts in the amount of **\$0.9 million**. The project is fully funded by the federal government and **is scheduled to commence next week with initial contractor mobilization** and be completed later this year. This important undertaking results in the elimination of six aged septic systems currently serving the properties thus improving the quality of life of the community and lake by eliminating any potential groundwater or surface water adverse impacts from the septic systems now or in the future.

f) Lastly, the City recently completed \$3.1 million in major improvements to its critical wastewater collection system lines, pump stations, manholes and related facilities and equipment. The funding for these improvements was provided by the state through a combination grant and partial low and no interest loan program over a three year period. This project was essential to meet state regulatory agency mandates for improving the City's aged wastewater utility infrastructure to be in compliance with its Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) operating permit and in so doing avoid costly penalties and fines. This comprehensive effort is not complete yet as the City was recently approved for an additional \$3.0 million in the form of another 80% grant and 20% no interest loan agreement to complete the balance of required wastewater collection system and maintenance program improvements during the next year. The remaining state required enhancements to the wastewater system to meet City obligations will be the largest project to date to upgrade and expand the treatment capabilities of the vintage 1980's WWTP facilities. The City in partnership with Hendry County has for some time actively pursued grant funding options to modernize the facility and prepare to meet future demand for the service.

The first five items are not all the City projects being undertaken this year, but comprise items that, combined with the funded and partially completed wastewater rehabilitation projects, total \$18.9 million in public infrastructure spending which have obvious long term benefits for Clewiston while also providing a shorter term economic boost to the local economy while the contracted projects are completed. As referenced, \$15.9 million ( or over 84%) of the total cost is being paid by federal and state grants which allows the City to minimize impacts on rates and fees charged to residents, customers and businesses to complete these necessary investments into Clewiston's future. Of course, excluded from these numbers is the large \$13.5 million WWTP rehabilitation and expansion project mentioned earlier for which funds remain uncommitted.

I will provide an update in a future installment on major pending projects being undertaken in partnership with Hendry County for additional state grant funded utility infrastructure to serve areas west of the current city limits along the U.S. 27 corridor to the airport and on some other lesser impactful but important infrastructure projects that the City has slated for the upcoming year and beyond.

Thank you for your continued support and interest in the City of Clewiston.

# Remove or enclose in a building all Openly Stored Items on Your Property before a Storm is Named

**City of Clewiston Ordinance** 

Sec. 18-246. - Sanitation requirements.

(d) Care of premises. It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupant of a residential building, structure, or property to utilize the premises of such residential property for the open storage of any abandoned motor vehicle or appliance, icebox, refrigerator, stove, glass, building material, building rubbish or similar items. It shall be the duty and responsibility of every such owner and occupant to keep the premises of such residential property clean and to remove from the premises all such abandoned items as listed in this subsection, including, but not limited to, weeds, dead trees, trash, garbage, etc., upon notice pursuant to this division.

#### Sec. 34-52. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Junk means wrecked, derelict, dismantled, partially dismantled or nonoperative vehicles, washing machines, refrigerators, dishwashers, water heaters, television sets, similar machinery, boats, old scrap copper, brass, rope, rags, batteries, paper, lumber, trash, rubber, debris, oddments, wastements, litter, leavings, ruins, castoffs, rummage, waste, and any other old scrap ferrous or nonferrous materials.

*Junkyard* means a place, structure, lot or parcel of land where junk is bought, sold, exchanged, stored, baled, packed, disassembled or handled as a business.

*Property* means any real property within the city which is not a street or highway.

*Street* or *highway* means the entire width between the boundary lines of every publicly dedicated right-of-way within the city.

Vehicle means a machine propelled by power other than human power designed to travel along the ground by the use of wheels, treads, runners or slides and shall include, but not be limited to, automobiles, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, tractors, buggies, wagons and farm equipment.

### Sec. 34-53. - Nuisance declared.

The accumulation and storage of junk not maintained as provided in this article shall constitute a nuisance, detrimental to health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the city.

(Code 1982, § 9-2; Code 1999, § 34-82; Ord. No. 88-5, pt. 1, 8-15-1988)

Sec. 34-54. - Junk on street or highway prohibited.

No person shall leave any junk upon a street or highway. This section shall not apply to grass, leaves, tree and shrub clippings and similar items which have been placed out to be picked up by the city.

(Code 1982, § 9-3; Code 1999, § 34-83; Ord. No. 88-5, pt. 1, 8-15-1988)

### Sec. 34-55. - Junk on real property prohibited; exceptions.

No person in charge or control of any property, whether as owner, occupant, lessee or otherwise, shall allow any junk to remain on any real property within the city for a period longer than 72 hours, nor shall any person deposit junk upon the real property of another person. This prohibition shall not apply to junk in an entirely enclosed building, a junkyard maintained in a lawful manner, or junk vehicles on the business property of a new or used vehicle business maintained in a lawful manner.

(Code 1982, § 9-4; Code 1999, § 34-84; Ord. No. 88-5, pt. 1, 8-15-1988)

### Sec. 34-56. - Notice for removal of junk on property.

It shall be the duty of the code enforcement officer to give written notice to the registered owner of any junk which is in violation of this article, and to the registered lienholder thereof, to the person responsible for depositing the junk, or to give such notice to the owner of the real property, or the person in charge or control of such real property, where such junk is situated (in cases where the identity of the owner or lienholder is not registered or otherwise readily ascertainable) advising such person that such junk violates this article and demanding that such junk be removed to a lawful place. Such notice may be given by personal service or by certified mail, return receipt requested. A copy of the written notice shall be posted on the property where the junk is located when the original notice is mailed or delivered.

(b)

Notice shall be deemed to be complete and sufficient when addressed to the owner and lien holder of the personal property, and the owners of the real property as shown on the registration of the personal property and on the latest tax roll and deposited in the United States mail with proper postage prepared.

# Police Chief Tom Lewis reports: Police Department

On March 3, 2022, the police department awarded several of our Police Explorers during their annual awards ceremony. Two of our Explorers also got promoted! The Explorers Unit is led by Sergeant Willie Roberts and has approximately 23 members. If you know of anyone interested in joining our team, please don't hesitate to reach out.



On March 17, 2022, the police department upgraded our Personal Protective Equipment that is



issued to employees with risk of occupational exposure. The new bags are red to be easily identified and are full of DuPont Tyvek suits (thanks to Hendry County EMS), as well as a First Responder kit to include protective clothing, face mask, gloves, eye protection, biohazard equipment, etc. All sworn officers, evidence technicians, and Animal Services staff will now have a higher level of personal protection.

On March 29, 2022, officers responded to First Bank, located at 300 East Sugarland Highway in

reference to a report of a bank robbery. Officers learned that a Hispanic male, approximately 5'5" in height, wearing a camouflage patterned hat, face mask, orange vest, and blue jeans demanded money from the bank teller. An unknown weapon was implied under the clothing during the incident. After receiving an undisclosed amount of money, the male fled on foot. Officers worked with Deputies and Crime Scene Technicians from the Hendry County Sheriff's Office as well as two agents from the FBI. Officer Rebecca Myers recognized the male in the bank video, officers made contact with him recovering some of the cash and later served a search warrant at his home. Detectives discovered the



remaining stolen cash hidden inside a pillow, the blue bag used to carry out the stolen cash, as well as clothing items he wore and the walkie-talkie used to depict a weapon during the robbery. He was placed under arrest and charged with Armed Bank Robbery.

New Employees - On February 14, 2022, Raul Garza and James Estiverne became the newest



police officers to join our men and women in blue. Raul comes to us from the Department of Corrections, is bilingual in Spanish, and lives right here in LaBelle. James comes to us from the Sanibel Police Department, is bilingual in French Creole, and lives in Lehigh Acres. They are both entering a multi-month Field Training Program



to prepare them for their new role. We are excited to have them aboard.

### **Animal Services**

In the month of March 2022, Animal Services reported the intake of 85 cats and 29 dogs.

# • Facility Maintenance:

- o The final touches have been applied to the Youth Center to finish the remodel project.
- o Minor plumbing repairs were made at the Senior Citizen building.
- o Three air conditioning repairs were made by the staff.
- o Plumbing repairs were made to facilities at the Ball Fields concession stands, Police Department and Library.
- o Exhaust fans at the Library need to be replaced and have been ordered.

# • Street Division:

- o From pressure washing areas around the Civic Park and the CS Mott pool, mulching Festival grounds and Sugarland Highway landscaping, to insect suppression and bee removal, staff contributed many hours to make another Sugar Festival a great success!
- Staff continues to remove shopping carts from all city streets and return them to the vendors
- o Staff has been working on potholes city-wide to ensure traffic safety.

### • Solid Waste:

- O Staff, with assistance from the Street Department, continues to work on keeping our streets clean of debris piles, even though we still struggle with equipment shortages.
- A "Demo" Solid Waste truck for residential pick up was tested to see whether it could be added to the fleet.
- o Thank you to our Code Enforcement for working with property owners to remove several large illegal piles of debris, sparing valuable crew time for other duties.

### • Ball Fields:

- o The 2022 season is in full swing and our teams are filling our fields.
- o Bee removal was done at the Ladies Soccer Field and in one of the dugout areas.
- o A fire ant treatment was performed on all playing and surrounding areas.
- We are troubleshooting an underground well issue on one of our soccer fields to determine the best course of action to repair this problem.

# • Recreation:

- Staff has been keeping up with inspections of our parks to ensure grounds are safe at all times.
- o The John B. Boy Auditorium events keep staff busy with all required maintenance needs.
- o A fire ant treatment was performed at Trinidad Park to ensure safe play for everyone.

- Central Garage: Staff continues to maintain the city fleet even though they struggle to find the needed parts from their vendors.
